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PARSONS APPEALS *TO WIFE'S CAPTORS*

Warns if Nothing Is Heard by Thursday He Will Request Officials to Act

STONY BROOK, L. I., June 21.-William H. Parsons, whose wife disappeared mysteriously twelve days ago, issued today a second public appeal to those he believes are holding her for \$25,000 ransom to communicate with him.

"If nothing is heard by noon Thursday, June 24," said his statement, "I will make a request to the law enforcement officers to immediately proceed with any possible action to bring to justice the persons responsible for my wife's disappearance."

Mr. Parsons issued his first appeal on Sunday, June 12, four days after his wife was reported to have climbed into an auto with two strangers at their farm home and driven off toward Huntington to show some property she had for sale or rent. A few hours later a penciled note demanding \$25,000 ransom was found in the back seat of the family car. Aside from Parsons' statement there were no developments yesterday.

Company, located just across the way from the Greenwich railroad station on Railroad Avenue, were questioned by the investigators.
